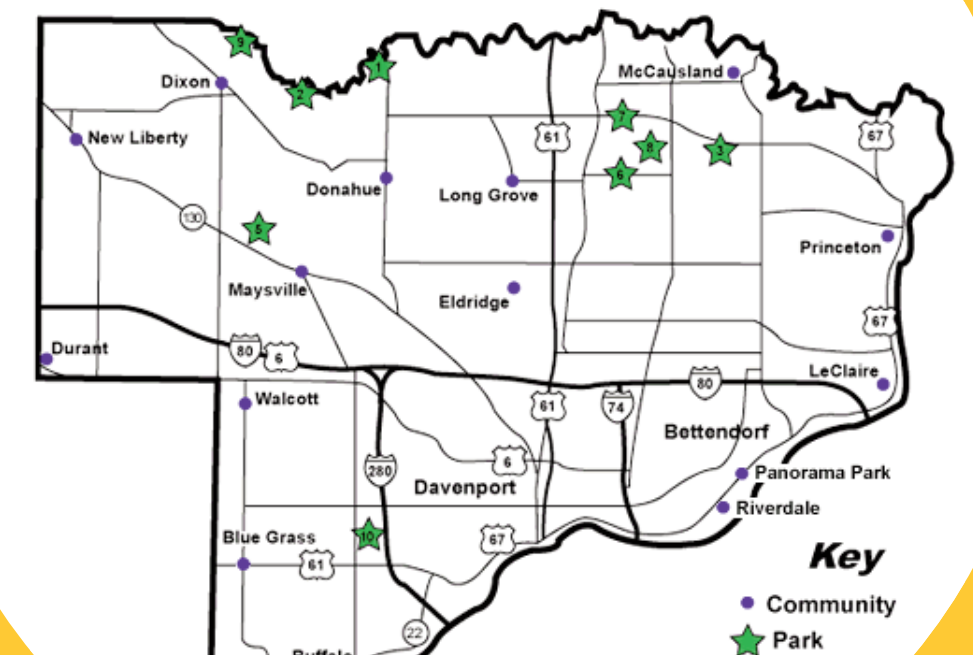

These funds are generated from gaming receipts received through the Isle of Capri Casino-Bettendorf.

Funds are awarded twice per calendar year. Applications with guidelines and procedures are available on-line at www.scottcountyregionalauthority.com or through local public libraries, school districts, city halls, chambers of commerce, and the SCRA office. They can be picked up March 1st and September 1st being due to the office by April 1st and October 1st, respectively.
